# **April Meeting Report**

Michael Holmes and Alexei Folger demonstrated and discussed FileMaker Pro 5.5 (FM 5.5), which now offers Web publishing, and an associated software package, FileMakerMobile. FM 5.5 will run on OS 8.6, on OS9 and on OS 10, and the accompanying CD ROM has installers for each. A server (5.5) running FM 5.5 will serve up to 125 users, with no "artificial hosts." Because of the presence of the SLAC gremlin, Michael and Alexi used a PC (sic) for demonstration. This was accepted, with some reluctance, by the assembled Macintosh crowd.

Based upon an impromptu poll of the audience, only Gavin uses the Developer version of FM 5.5, which includes a database diagrammer and scripter, improved documentation, developer tools and global file renaming.

The Unlimited version of FM 5.5 is not, regrettably, unlimited in all respects. This version provides FileMaker for the Web and can accommodate only up to 10 users in a 12-hour period. The phrase "Unlimited" refers to the number of hits by this mini-set of users in any time interval.

Some spreadsheet problems in past versions were mentioned, including accommodation of multiple simultaneous users, security and uniformity of display. Users of FM 5.5 will make their own assessment of how well these are handled. An Excel spreadsheet can be quickly converted to an FM 5.5 spreadsheet, after the user answers a few questions relevant to conversion. Optionally, columns remain as columns, although these are treated as global or local fields in FM 5.5. Global or local calculation fields can be set up. A file

The application is an extendable framework for puzzle games, open for other developers to add games. Requires OS X. Free.



#### ShadowKiller 1.1 (OSX)

When enabled, this haxie will remove window and menu shadows in Mac OS X. Requires OS X. Free.



# Time Ballz 2.1 (OSX)

A screensaver module for Mac OS X that displays a clock. The current time is displayed in "HH:MM" or "HH:MM:SS" format. Each digit is composed of a matrix of small 3D shapes which rotate to form numerals. Several shapes are available. Requires OS X. \$2.



# WindowShade X 1.5.1

WindowShade X is a haxie that brings WindowShade functionality into MacOS X. When you double-click a window title or try to minimize a window, it will do action which is different from the default MacOS X behavior (putting the window in the Dock). WindowShade X has 3 alternative minimize styles: WindowShade, Make Window Transparent, and Hide Application. You can also minimize the window in the Dock like before, if you hold Control button on your keyboard while minimizing. Requires OS X 10.1+. \$7.



#### **Xounds 1.1.2 (OSX)**

Xounds is a haxie that brings back Appearance Sounds to MacOS X. Tired of silence? Want audio feedback when you navigate through menus or drag your windows around? Xounds will convert your existing MacOS 8 or 9 soundsets and make MacOS X a better place to work in. Note that even though not all event sounds are being played yet in the current version of Xounds, we are working on bringing more of them for the future versions of this useful haxie. Requires OS X 10.1+. \$7.

# John McGibney posted this in info-mac:

On power up, a powerbook may go into a dark screen, with "welcome to open firmware, type mac-boot to start....".

Type mac-boot and it may return "default catch code=300". hit the PRAM reset on the back, now it powers up, HD spins up, fan comes on, but screen is totally blank.

If this happens, shut down, re-power-up, and in the firmwear prompt, try this comand:

#### reset-ALL

type it exactly as shown.



# Scale not genie. from oreillynet.com

Using the "genie effect" to open and close items from the dock is fun — for the first time or two. But after the novelty wears off, you'll most likely discover that it draws more processing power than it's worth. In Mac OSX 10.1 you have an option called "scale." It's still cool looking, but it's more efficient cpu-wise. To enable scale, open the dock preferences panel and choose "minimizing using scale effect."

Switching to scale doesn't mean that you can't still impress your friends, however. Hold down the shift key while minimizing to create the slow-motion effect that you've seen performed in apple demos.

# Simply Mac/April

Mac basics we sometimes forget

What are clippings? They are a special file type Apple created to help with cut&paste. They look like Simpletext documents but you cannot edit their contents. You CAN scroll through them and change their names. To create one, highlight the text you want to clip, drag to the desktop. The default name is the first few words of text. Change if you want.

To paste one, open it, COPY (command-c), go to your new document, and paste. You cannot select the text to copy, only the entire clipping. (You can always edit afterwards in your new document)

# Simply Mac/May

Mac basics we sometimes forget Why partition?

Most people do it to have 2 Operating Systems on their mac, and don't want to spring for another drive.

Another good reason to partition is the ability to keep a live backup of your current operating system so all you need to do in case of corruption is copy the clean System Folder from your back-up partition onto your main partition.

People also do it because they want to get into video editing, don't need a new hard drive, but want some separate space to store unfinished movies.

Why not partition? If you need to access both partitions simultaneously, a single drive can be quite slow. And if you need to reformat you have to back up all partitions first. Disks now are cheap. If you have the room, it might be a better way to go.

size limitation of 2 Gbytes maximum is imposed, but otherwise no limit is imposed on the number of files. Alexi briefly demonstrated use of a spreadsheet in FM 5.5.

FM 5.5 allows use of multi-level, multi-field passwords so that different users can be granted access to different groups of fields. Record level security allows selective access to records within a file and to selective deletion of records [This seems dangerous to me]. Different levels of passwords, based in part on the number of days that have passed since the last transaction, dollar volume, etc. can be provided. The FM 5.5 system can deny access to a browser, can allow browsing but deny editing, and can deny user-initiated change of a password.

FM 5.5 for the OSX requires a G3 or higher, with at least 128 Mbytes of RAM and a hard drive and CD ROM. FM 5.5 for other Mac OS systems (8.4 through 9.1) requires at least 32 Mbytes of RAM, a hard drive and a CD ROM. OS 8.6 or later is required for use of the Web Companion features. The equivalent version for Windows has similar requirements. FM 5.5 allows cross platform file sharing between Mac OS and Windows. The retail price of FM 5.5 is \$249, or \$149 for an upgrade.

FileMakerMobile, for use with certain PDAs, has been announced but has not yet shipped. FileMakerMobile is intended for use with Palm OSX (load-and-go) and uses HotSync for downloading.
